Christmas (December 25)

Caesar Augustus, the Roman emperor, sent out a decree that everyone in his empire had to be taxed. Each man was to pay taxes in the city of his ancestors, so Joseph and Mary had to travel from their home in Nazareth to Bethlehem to pay taxes. Bethlehem was crowded with people, and the inns were full. Joseph and Mary found a place to stay in a stable, where the baby Jesus was born. Mary wrapped the him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger. Angels told shepherds the joyful news of Christ's birth, and the shepherds hurried to Bethlehem to see the newborn Savior.

Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ who was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. Until he was thirty, he worked in a carpenter shop and then for three years he was an itinerant preacher. He wrote no books. He held no office. He never owned a home. He was never in a big city. He never traveled two hundred miles from the place he was born. He never did any of the things that usually accompany greatness. The authorities condemned his teachings. His friends deserted him. One betrayed him to his enemies for a paltry sum. One denied him. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for the only piece of property he owned on earth: His coat. When he was dead, he was taken down and placed in a borrowed grave. More than twenty centuries have come and gone, yet today his teachings live on. He is revered by more than one-third of the earth's inhabitants. All the armies that ever marched and all the Navies that were ever assembled and all the parliaments that ever sat and all the rulers that ever reigned - combined - have not had the lasting impact that this One Solitary Life has had upon humanity.



Hanukkah (December 1-9)

In Hebrew, the word "Hanukkah" means "dedication." The name reminds us that this holiday commemorates the re-dedication of the holy Temple in Jerusalem following the Jewish victory over the Syrian-Greeks in 165 BC

In 168 BC the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem was seized by Syrian-Greek soldiers and dedicated to the worship of Zeus. In 167 BC, the Syrian-Greek emperor Antiochus ordered all Jews to worship Greek gods and made the observance of Judaism an offense punishable by death.

Resistance to these new laws was led by Mattathias, a High Priest, who, along with his family and supporters, went into hiding in the mountains. Eventually they succeeded in retaking their land from the Greeks. These rebels became known as the Maccabees.

Once the Maccabees had regained control they returned to the Temple in Jerusalem. Jewish troops were determined to purify the Temple by burning ritual oil in the Temple's menorah for eight days. But to their dismay, they discovered that there was only one day's worth of oil left in the Temple. They lit the menorah anyway and, wonder of wonders, the small amount of oil lasted the full eight days!

This is the miracle of the Hanukkah oil that is celebrated every year when Jews light a special menorah known as a hanukkiyah for eight days. One candle is lit on the first night of Hanukkah, two on the second, and so on, until eight candles are lit.

Back to School for Media Rotarians



The Media Rotary Club visited [Media Providence Friends School](#) in November and were assisted by eighth grade students for a lesson in "Singapore Math" by T. Roger. Club members were guided through math concepts with explanations that are exceptionally clear and simple, often just a few words and a series of boxes drawn on a piece of paper. The hallmark of the curriculum is the careful guidance of students, done in a child-friendly pictorial language, not only to technical mastery, but to complete understanding of all the "whys". This differs from typical U.S. curricula, which either aim for dogmatic memorization of "rules," or expect students to reconstruct mathematical ideas from hands-on activities without much guidance.

Chairman of **PA Veterans Museum** Speaks to the Club



Steve Miller in addition to being the Chairman of the PVM, is a practicing attorney, a Lt. Col in the Air National Guard and an F-18 pilot. Steve describes himself as a "Citizen Soldier," because of his commitment to The Guard.

Steve held the club spellbound as he described his experiences as a commercial airline pilot on September 11, 2001, flying from Boston to Laguardia. This was followed by a race (in his car) from New York to New Jersey to rejoin his Air National Guard Unit to get airborne in his F-18.

For months following 9/11, Steve patrolled the airspace over New York and DC as the nation came to grips with the reality of terrorism in the modern world.

Steve gave us a very comprehensive overview of the PVM, a jewel in Media's downtown business district. "The PVM is a great resource for anyone who wants to know what our Veterans have done to protect our country", Steve said. "There are Veteran volunteers available to answer questions with first-hand knowledge of some of the major turning points in our history."

- The first Rotary club meeting was in Chicago, Illinois, on 23 February 1905.
- The first regular luncheon meetings were in Oakland, California, chartered in 1909.
- The first Rotary convention was in Chicago in 1910.
- The first Rotary club outside of North America was chartered in Dublin, Ireland, in 1911.
- The first Rotary club in a non-English-speaking country was in Havana, Cuba, in 1916.
- The first Rotary club in South America was chartered in Montevideo, Uruguay, in 1918.
- The first Rotary club in Asia was chartered in Manila, Philippines, in 1919.
- The first Rotary club in Africa was chartered in Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1921.
- The first Rotary club in Australia was chartered in Melbourne in 1921.
- The first Rotary club outside of the United States was chartered in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, in 1910.

Author of "Jailing the Johnston Gang" to speak to the Club



Bruce Mowday, former Daily Local News reporter, has written a book which is an inside story of the dedicated law enforcement team that brought to justice serial murderers Norman, David and Bruce A. Johnston, who for more than a decade terrorized communities throughout the East Coast of the United States.

Pennsylvania's Johnston Gang, led by Bruce Johnston Sr. and his brothers Norman and David, netted millions through a prolific burglary ring during the 1960s and '70s. But in 1978, fearing that younger members of the gang were going to rat them out to the authorities, the brothers killed four teenagers and nearly killed Bruce Johnston Sr.'s own son. The book draws on personal interviews with investigators, attorneys, and even former gang members to detail how the combined efforts of federal, state, county, and local law enforcement agencies brought the Johnston Gang to justice.
